Apology of the Augsburg Confession, Articles VII and VIII. The Church

If the Church, which is truly the kingdom of Christ, is distinguished from the kingdom of the devil, it follows necessarily that the wicked, since they are in the kingdom of the devil, are not the Church; although in this life, because the kingdom of Christ has not yet been revealed; they are mingled with the Church, and hold offices [as teachers, and other offices] in the Church. 18] Neither are the wicked the kingdom of Christ, for the reason that the revelation has not yet been made. For that is always the kingdom which He quickens by His Spirit, whether it be revealed or be covered by the cross; just as He who has now been glorified is the same Christ who was before afflicted. 19] And with this clearly agree the parables of Christ, who says, Matt. 13, 38, that *the good seed are the children of the kingdom, but the tares are the children of the Wicked One. The field, He says, is the world, not the Church.* Thus John [Matt. 3, 12: *He will thoroughly purge His floor, and gather His wheat into the garner; but He will burn up the chaff*] speaks concerning the whole race of the Jews, and says that it will come to pass that the true Church will be separated from that people. Therefore, this passage is more against the adversaries than in favor of them, because it shows that the true and spiritual people is to be separated from the carnal people. **Christ also speaks of the outward appearance of the Church when He says,** Matt. 13, 47: *The kingdom of heaven is like unto a net, likewise, the ten virgins*[**Matt 25:1**]; and He teaches that the Church has been covered by a multitude of evils, in order that this stumbling-block may not offend the pious; likewise, in order that we may know that the Word and Sacraments are efficacious even when administered by the wicked. And meanwhile He teaches that these godless men, although they have the fellowship of outward signs, are nevertheless not the true kingdom of Christ and members of Christ; **20]** for they are members of the kingdom of the devil. Neither, indeed, are we dreaming of a Platonic state, as some wickedly charge, **but we say that this Church exists, namely, the truly believing and righteous men scattered throughout the whole world.** [We are speaking not of an imaginary Church, which is to be found nowhere; but we say and know certainly that this Church, wherein saints live, is and abides truly upon earth; namely, that some of God's children are here and there in all the world, in various kingdoms, islands, lands, and cities, from the rising of the sun to its setting, who have truly learned to know Christ and His Gospel.] **And we add the marks: the pure doctrine of the Gospel [the ministry or the Gospel] and the Sacraments.** And this Church is properly the pillar of the truth, 1 Tim. 3, 15. For it retains the pure Gospel, and, as Paul says, 1 Cor. 3, 11 [:"Other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ"]; *the foundation, i.e., the true knowledge of Christ and faith.* Although among these [in the body which is built upon the true foundation, i.e., upon Christ and faith] there are also many weak persons, *who build upon the foundation stubble that will perish, i.e., certain unprofitable opinions* [some human thoughts and opinions], which, nevertheless, because they do not overthrow the foundation, are both forgiven them **21]** and also corrected.

Questions to Ponder in Prayer

Introduction: In Jewish custom the parents arrange the betrothal or marriage. This "engagement" unlike our engagement was the marriage itself and not simply the promise to marry at a future date. Some evening in the future, the groom and his friends would make a festive procession to the home of the bride, who was accompanied by her maiden companions. He would take her to the wedding banquet and his home.

1. "The kingdom of heaven," is God's church in His Son Jesus(Mt 3:2). We need to ask ourselves how does this parable describe the ways of God in His church?
2. There are ten virgins. Ten is a number that symbolized completeness. This parable is one of many which show that true believers and hypocrites (false believers) will exist side by side. Note the many ways in which all ten virgins were alike. A) All of them had lamps. (B) All of them went out to meet the bridegroom. (C) All of them became drowsy and fell asleep. (D) All of them wanted to go into the marriage feast.
3. What was the difference between the wise and the foolish?
4. How is their action foolish?
5. Why weren't they ready?
6. The five wise virgins wouldn't share. Why not? Are they being rude?
7. When does the separation of the virgins occur?
8. With what do we compare the finality of the phrase, "And the door was shut."? What do we find out concerning the relationship of the foolish virgins and the bridegroom?
9. What does "Keep watch." mean (in 24:42 and 25:13)? See Psalm 39:4-5,7-8

Catechesis on St. Matthew 25:1-13

1“Then the kingdom of heaven shall be likened to ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. 2“Now five of them were wise, and five were foolish. 3“Those who were foolish took their lamps and took no oil with them, 4“but the wise took oil in their vessels with their lamps. 5“But while the bridegroom was delayed, they all slumbered and slept. 6“And at midnight a cry was heard: ‘Behold, the bridegroom is coming; go out to meet him!’ 7“Then all those virgins arose and trimmed their lamps. 8“And the foolish said to the wise, ‘Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.’ 9“But the wise answered, saying, ‘No, lest there should not be enough for us and you; but go rather to those who sell, and buy for yourselves.’ 10“And while they went to buy, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went in with him to the wedding; and the door was shut. 11“Afterward the other virgins came also, saying, ‘Lord, Lord, open to us!’ 12“But he answered and said, ‘Assuredly, I say to you, I do not know you.’ 13“Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour in which the Son of Man is coming. (NKJV)

End of the World

“The Seventeenth Article the adversaries receive without exception, in which we confess that at the consummation of the world Christ shall appear, and shall raise up all the dead, and shall give to the godly eternal life and, eternal joys, but shall condemn the ungodly to be punished with the devil without end (Apology Article XVII: Of Christ’s Return to Judgment, 66).

John 3:36, “He who believes in the Son has everlasting life; and he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him.”

Mark 16:16, “He who believes and is baptized will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned.

Eternal Damnation

“They condemn the Anabaptists, who think that there will be an end to the punishments of condemned men and devils” (AC XVII, 4)

Matthew 25:41, “Depart from Me, you cursed, into the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels.”

Matthew 8:12, “But the sons of the kingdom will be cast out into outer darkness. There will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.”

Mark 3:29, “he who blasphemes against the Holy Spirit never has forgiveness, but is subject to eternal condemnation.”

Romans 2:15, “...who show the work of the law written in their hearts, their conscience also bearing witness, and between themselves **their thoughts accusing** or else excusing them).”

Eternal Life

“Meanwhile, however, while sanctification has begun and is growing daily, we expect that our flesh will be destroyed and buried with all its uncleanness, and will come forth gloriously, and arise to entire and perfect holiness in a new eternal life” (LC III, 57).

Matthew 25:34, 46, “Then the King will say to those on His right hand, ‘Come, you blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world....46“And these will go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.”

John 17:24, “Father, I desire that they also whom You gave Me may be with Me where I am, that they may behold My glory which You have given Me; for You loved Me....”

2 Timothy 4:18, “And the Lord will deliver me from every evil work and preserve me for His heavenly kingdom.

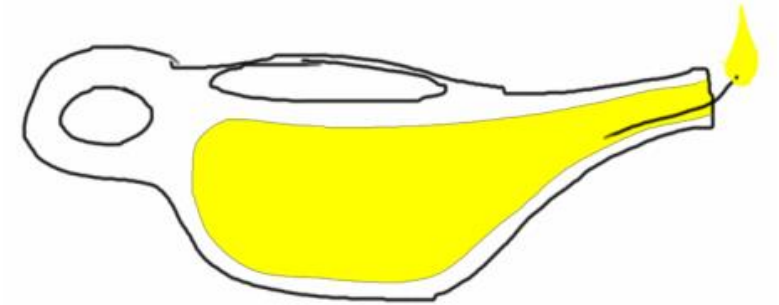

Degrees of Punishment or Glory(not bliss)

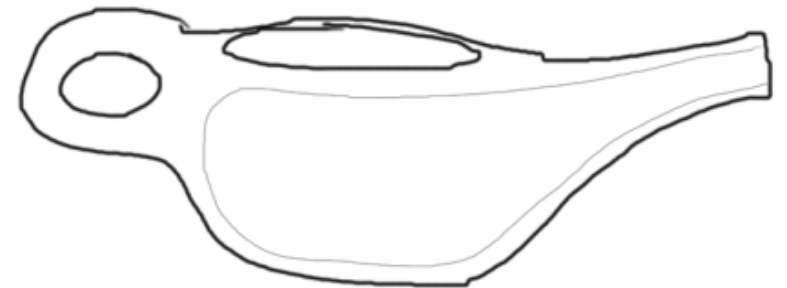
Matthew 11:22, “But I say to you, it will be more tolerable for Tyre and Sidon in the day of judgment than for you.”

The Lord's Prayer, Fourth Petition

“To comprise it briefly, this petition includes **everything that belongs to our entire life in the world**, because on that account alone do we need daily bread.” (LC III 73).

The Daily Bread (material sustenance)

“For when you mention and pray for daily bread, **you pray for everything that is necessary in order to have and enjoy daily bread and, on the other hand, against everything which interferes with it.** Therefore you must open wide and extend your thoughts not only to the oven or the flour-bin, but to the distant field and the entire land, which bears and brings to us daily bread and every sort of sustenance. For if God did not cause it to grow, and bless and preserve it in the field, we could never take bread from the oven or have any to set upon the table” (LC III, 72).

Genesis 3:19, “In the sweat of your face you shall eat bread Till you return to the ground, For out of it you were taken; For dust you are, And to dust you shall return.”

Matthew 5:45b, “For He makes His sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust.”

Psalms 145:15-16, “The eyes of all look to you, and you give them their food at the proper time. 16 You open your hand and satisfy the desires of every living thing.”

The Promise for Christians

“**How would it be possible for a person to starve to death who serves God with fidelity and furthers His kingdom?** After all, He gives the whole world more than enough. The earth would have to run out of bread or the heavens would have to run out of rain before a Christian would die of starvation; indeed, God Himself would have to starve to death first. Now, since He has created and given so superabundantly and **given such a sure promise** that He will give enough and will do so before we look around or become aware of it, why plague yourself with this terrible anxiety and greed? Everywhere, but especially in the Psalter, Scripture is full of statements like these (Ps. 33:19): “He feeds the pious in time of famine”; and (Ps. 37:19, 25): “I have never seen a pious man beg for bread.” **He will not let your situation make a liar out of Him. Just believe!** If the present world of noblemen, peasants, and city people refuses to do this, He can find other people or other means through which to give, and to give more than they can ever take away from you” (Luther's Works, volume 21, p.207). Matthew 6:33, “But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, **and all these things shall be added to you.**” (See Mt 6:25-34, 15th Sunday after Trinity)

Matthew 7:7-8, “Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. 8 “For everyone who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened.

The Eucharistic Bread (spiritual sustenance)

“Therefore, it is appropriately called the food of the soul since it nourishes and strengthens the new man. While it is true that through Baptism we are first born anew, our human flesh and blood have not lost their old skin. There are so many hindrances and temptations of the devil and the world that we often grow weary and faint, at times even stumble. 24 **The Lord's Supper is given as a daily food and sustenance** so that our faith may refresh and strengthen itself and not weaken in the struggle but grow continually stronger” (LC, V 23-24).

1 Corinthians 10:16, “The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? **The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?**”

Acts 2:42, 46-47 “And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, **in the breaking of bread**, and in prayers.... 46 **So continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, they ate their food with gladness and simplicity of heart**, 47 praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to the church daily those who were being saved.”

John 6 (Jesus is the Bread of Life)

Matthew 4:4, “But He answered and said, “It is written, ‘Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God.’” **(which is taken from Dt 8:3)**

Deuteronomy 8:3, “So He humbled you, allowed you to hunger, and fed you with manna which you did not know nor did your fathers know, that He might make you know that man shall not live by bread alone; but man lives by every word that proceeds from the mouth of the Lord.” **(which is the context of John 6)**

John 6:31-35, “Our fathers ate the manna in the desert; as it is written, ‘He gave them bread from heaven to eat.’ Then Jesus said to them, ‘Most assuredly, I say to you, Moses did not give you the bread from heaven, but **My Father gives you the true bread from heaven. 33 For the bread of God is He who comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.**’ 34 Then they said to Him, ‘**Lord, give us this bread always.**’ 35 And Jesus said to them, ‘**I am the bread of life.** He who comes to Me shall never hunger, and he who believes in Me shall never thirst.’”

The 4th & 5th Petition “...our daily bread and forgive us...”

In the liturgical context, the Lord's Prayer was spoken in close proximity to the Words of Institution. Soon to follow was the reception of Christ's Body and Blood for the forgiveness of sins.
