

Trinity Lutheran Church is served by pastors who are members of the Evangelical Lutheran Diocese of North America(Eldona.org).

--Those who are members of Eldona-affiliated congregations are welcome to commune after announcing to Pastor Henson.

--Those who are not members of Eldona-affiliated congregations will need to set up an appointment with Pastor Henson to discuss their public church membership.

The Lord's Supper is celebrated at Trinity Lutheran Church in the confession and glad confidence that, as He says, our Lord gives into our mouths not only bread and wine but His very body and blood to eat and to drink for the forgiveness of sins and to strengthen our union with Him and with one another. Our Lord invites to His table those who trust His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth his death until He comes.

Those who are not yet invited to receive the Sacrament are encouraged to meditate on God's Word in the distribution hymns and pray for the day when our divisions will have ceased.

And yet this is not the final cause of afflictions, but it is rather mortification and getting rid of sins and of that original evil which clings to nature. And the more you are purged, the more you will be blessed in the life to come. For glory will undoubtedly follow the misfortunes and vexations which we endure in this world. **But the main purpose of an these is the cleansing,** which is altogether necessary and useful, lest we snore and become dull because of the laziness and sluggishness of our flesh. For when there is peace and quiet, we do not pray. Nor do we meditate on the Word, but we treat the Scriptures and all things that belong to God coldly or finally slip into fatal smugness.

Therefore we must be troubled and humbled, if not by bloodshed and imprisonment, as the saintly martyrs suffered, at least through spiritual trials, sorrow, grief, and anguish of heart. Otherwise we shall perish in our sins. For the flesh is corrupt, filled with poison, leprous, and has need of a physician to counteract that rottenness by means of cross, martyrdom, sadness, confusion, and disgrace. These, you see, are the medicines with which God purges away sin.

Holy Scripture is full of such examples. They show that the saints must endure. For when they are not subjected to trials, they forget their spiritual exercises. Then they pray, believe, and praise rather lazily. On the other hand, they cry out, groan, and complain when misfortunes come, and thus they are disciplined and instructed in the Word, as Isaiah says (Is. 28:19): "Vexation gives understanding."

But finally, when the trial is over, the most merciful Father and Savior of our souls appears and says: "I am the Lord your God. I have scourged and harassed you." Thus Joseph exclaims here: "I AM JOSEPH. I have irritated and disciplined you in various ways, not in a spirit of hostility or because of a desire to destroy you but rather to arouse penitence in you and a purging away of sin, that you might become righteous. Therefore do not fear; for I am not the person you imagine me to be, a cruel and harsh Egyptian tyrant. You are making a big mistake."

In the same way the thoughts, the murmurings, and the suspicions of the godly concerning God are false. For we cannot understand the reason for His counsels. "What I am doing you do not know now," Christ says to Peter in John 13:7, "but afterward you will understand. I shall wash your feet, but what this washing means you do not understand."

Thus in the time of suffering we do not see the will of God and His counsels. For this reason those who are afflicted tremble horribly and struggle with unbelief, indignation against God, and despair. But when with God's help they firmly retain faith and hope, lest they be completely cast down in spirit, then there is no danger; for God does not reckon those complaints and that murmuring as sin. Later, however, He comes and says: "I am the Lord your Savior." (p.7-8)
