

## **Passiontide**

A clearly defined period within Lent begins with the Fifth Sunday in Lent. From very early times this week and Holy Week have been spoken of as

Passiontide and marked the formal ecclesiastical observance of a special period in commemoration of our Lord's Passion. It is the third step in our preparation for Easter, which began with Septuagesima. It was intensified until we reached the Sunday of Refreshment(4th Sunday in Lent), which brought the transition from the rigorous demands of Lent to the contemplation of our Lord's suffering and death. The preparation for our rising to newness of life with Christ continues, but the Savior's Passion is now introduced as an appeal to our heart and conscience. The sense of pardon is conveyed by contemplating the Sacrifice, but at the same time our compunction for sin is to be increased. Pardon given without some method of emphasizing guilt might make men think lightly of sin. This is prevented by impressing on us: "You were bought with a price." In the two weeks beginning with Judica, both elements, pardon and sacrifice, are presented. The fact that we think and speak of our Lord's suffering and death with intense concentration will deepen the solemnity of our worship, but our Services should not be morose and desolate. All during Lent our Liturgy leads us to lament our sins, but it never leaves us without the joyous assurance of acceptance by God. While the Propers of Judica and Holy Week impress upon us the enormity of our sin by holding before us the tremendous Sacrifice and the ugliness of our sins in the light of the Sufferer's holiness, a quiet joy in our redemption should pervade our worship, even on Good Friday.

The final two weeks before Easter is called <u>Passiontide</u>, a period devoted to meditation upon the suffering and death of Jesus Christ. During this time not only is the alleluia not used(as during Lent), but even the Gloria Patri is taken away.

- --With today's reading for Passion Week(3/26-4/1), we see the increasing opposition that Jesus faced the last year of his ministry (Jn 8:42f).
- --Holy Week(4/2-4/9) is devoted to the last week of Jesus' Life. Though it begins with a palm procession(Mt 21:1f), the theme of the week is clearly the extended readings from Jesus' Passion.
- --Sunday(4/2) is St. Matthew, chapters 26 &27.
- --Tuesday(4/4) is St. Mark, chapters 14 & 15.
- --Wednesday(4/5) is St. Luke, chapters 22 & 23.
- --Friday(4/7) is St. John, chapters 18 & 19
