#60 Such Power To Forgive Sins is Give to Men

This Gospel teaches us to note particularly the good tidings which God has granted us, that we may here on earth say to each other, "Thy sins are forgiven thee," so

that with the people here spoken of we may marvel and glorify God, Which had given such power unto men. And it is indeed a great power that one Christian may say to another: My brother, be of good cheer, you have a gracious God; only believe the assurance which I give you in Christ's name and it is as certain as if God Himself had said to you, Thy sins are forgiven thee. Such power, as we hear, originated in Christ and is now given unto men, especially to those who are in office and are commanded to preach the Gospel, that is, repentance and forgiveness of sins, in Jesus' name. Other Christians, although they are not in that office, also have the command, in case of necessity, to comfort you when you are troubled on account of your sins, and to say: Why are you troubled? I, as a Christian, assure you that you are wronging yourself; God is not unmerciful unto you. You are for Christ's sake to put all your trust in His grace. The Lord's Supper

The Lord's Supper is being celebrated today. Please note that our practice of closed communion with those who are in fellowship with us—members of congregations of the

ELDoNA—is not meant to offend, but is the historic practice of the Church. It is prompted by love, both for God's Word and for God's people. It does not deny that members of other denominations may be Christians. Rather, it bows the knee to the Bible's deep concern for doctrinal truth (Rom. 16:17) and the Bible's witness that doctrinal unity (Acts 2:42) is the central issue to the common reception of the Sacrament of the Altar. Therefore, we ask GUESTS desiring to commune to speak with the pastor before the service so that he may know that you are a member of a congregation in fellowship with Trinity Lutheran Church.

Hike with Pastor (Mike) Henson and Picnic

On Sunday, October 13, we are meeting at 3 PM at the Rend Lake Visitor's Center which is located on the south-west corner of the lake at the corner of Rend Lake Dam Road and Rend City Road.

For the faint at heart, there is a short hike called "Catfish Cove Pond and Trails" behind the visitor center. It is a short 0.25 mile concrete circle path around a fishing pond. If you connect it to the mown path through the woods it is a total of 0.7 miles. The visitor center is open until 5 PM if you just want to check it out.

At 3:15 PM the more adventuresome hikers will travel down Rend City Road for 2.3 miles to **the Blackberry Nature Trail**. This trail has been newly expanded to a total of 1.7 miles, with slight elevation changes. The hike should take about an hour.

Following the hike(s) we will have a picnic at Dan and LeeAnn Byrne's campsite in North Sandusky Campground, Hickory campsite #102 (Google Maps calls it "Sandusky Creek West Public Use Area, Sesser, IL 62884" from Loon Lane, take a right on Hickory). 

The Te Deum Laudamus

The *Te Deum Laudamus* is one of the grandest hymns of Christendom. Although one legend ascribed it to Athanasius and Ambrose, it actually grew over time from many traditional strands.

The text goes back to very early Christian rites of the matins/vespers of the Greek church. The earliest evidence for it goes back to Bishop Nicetas (c.335-414) of Remesiana. By the fifth century it is included in the rules of monastic orders. The melody goes back to at least the 2nd or 3rd century.

Luther thought so highly of the *Te Deum* that he called it the third creed or symbol after the Apostles Creed and the Athanasian Creed. Dr. Luther wrote this paraphrase and rhymed translation so that it could be sung in the language of the people. His composition is often simply called *Das Deutsche Tedeum* (The German Tedeum). Most composers who tried their hand at an original composition have either borrowed from Luther and/or kept his antiphonal form.

"Luther wanted the two groups singing the *Te* Deum to alternate half-verse by half-verse instead of verse by verse as done in other antiphonal chants (e.g., the Gloria). This does not mean that two actual choirs were to sing the Te Deum. The Wittenberg church order of 1533 prescribes: 'After the hymn let the choir intone the *Te Deum* laudamus, in Dr. Martin's German translation, and let one of the choristers in the schoolboys' pew answer with the congregation at the halfverses. For the start he may also take a few boys into the pew to help him, until the congregation gets accustomed to singing along in this Te Deum.' In other words, the first half-verse was to be sung by the choir, and the second by the congregation (reinforced by a few choir members).

Luther's German Te Deum became as popular in the Lutheran church as the Latin version had been before. It was sung not only at Matins but also in the service for festival days, such as St. Michael's, All Saints', and Thanksgiving, and for occasional services such as confirmation and marriage."

Luther's translation was first printed in Klug's Hymnal of 1529 and then in the Andrew Rauscher hymnal of 1531. Luther's *Te Deum* was translated into English and used in the first *Book of Common Prayer* (1549). It was used daily in the order of Matins.
