#57 By the Example of Jesus, We will Be Urged to Love Our Neighbor

If we believe these truths with all our heart, we will be urged by the example of the Samaritan to love our

neighbor. It is the nature of the Word, whenever it is rightly heard and believed, to make such people as the Samaritan here, who are full of pity and kindness toward every sufferer. When they find others in misery, they are ready to deliver them at their own trouble and expense. I have reference here to the help of indigent poor who are not in the habit of begging, like the indolent, idle and slothful professional beggars, who never can be induced to labor, but wander about over the whole country. Such vagabonds should not be supported. But when a Christian meets a worthy poor person he will be ready to help, like the Samaritan. He will reason thus: It is my neighbor, a man composed of body and soul like myself, and having the same God that I have. Hence he has also more claim on me than any other creature, and I will not pass him by. Come, dear brother, let me help thee, etc. He has compassion on him, as the Samaritan had compassion on the man having fallen among thieves, or a mother on her sick and suffering child. Eutychus at Ephesus in Acts 20:7-12

Acts 20:7-12, "Now on the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul, ready to depart the next day, spoke to them and continued his message until midnight. 8There were many lamps in the upper room where they were gathered together. 9And in a window sat a certain young man named Eutychus, who was sinking into a deep sleep. He was overcome by sleep; and as Paul continued speaking, he fell down from the third story and was taken up dead. 10But Paul went down, fell on him, and embracing him said, "Do not trouble yourselves, for his life is in him." 11Now when he had come up, had broken bread and eaten, and talked a long while, even till daybreak, he departed. 12And they brought the young man in alive, and they were not a little comforted.


St. Matthew 6:24-34

²⁴ "No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will be loyal to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon. ²⁵ Therefore I say to you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink; nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? ²⁶ Look at the birds of the air, for they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? ²⁷ Which of you by worrying can add one cubit to his stature? ²⁸ So why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin; ²⁹ and yet I say to you that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. ³⁰ Now if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is, and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will He not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? 31 Therefore do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' 32 For after all these things the Gentiles seek. For your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. ³³ But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you. ³⁴ Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble."



The Herrin House of Hope will host the 13th annual Family Fun Dayon Sunday, September 8 from 12:30-6:00pm to benefit and celebrate our amazing 12 years of operation and service to the Herrin Community on the grounds of Community of Faith Church and also via a VIRTUAL platform this year.

All the proceeds of the day will go to help support the ministry of the Herrin House of Hope through its' Hot lunch program, thrift store, auxiliary food pantry, GED Classes, and Children's Free Summer Meals Program, all a part of our broad-based ministry which was designed by the partnership of churches in the Herrin area to give people a boost in fighting poverty and overcoming times of hardship.

The House of Hope is currently providing meals Monday-Friday, each-and-every week, for between 150-200 people a day or around 750-1000 meals per week. During the height of the Covid shutdown,we saw demands dramatically increase to nearly 300-500 meals a day, to as many as 2818 per week at the height. Through the crisis, the House of Hope has been there every day, as an essential emergency feeding center for the last 12 years providing some 400,000 meals. Everyone that needs a meal—receives one at the House of Hope thanks to incredible community support!

In summary during our 12 years of operation from 2013-2024:

- •Served some 400,000 meals for needy adults and children.
- •Served over 35,000 persons through our auxiliary emergency food pantry& commodities distribution programsince it opened in July 2014, 10 years ago.
- •Served over 20,000 people in our Thrift Store, since it opened in October 2014.
- •Seen over 500+ students go through our on-site GED Program led by John A. Logan Jr. College, since it began in 2014.
- •Now in our 8th Summer (May 30 to August 31) offering our Children's Free Summer Meals Program. We have fed over 25,000 meals to children 0-18.
- •Blessed with over 18,000 volunteer days served by those saints who have come in and out of our doors, just this year,to share the Hope and Love of Christ with those that need ahand of Hope in the Herrin Community, through a day of service.

This year's Family Fun Day has a goal of raising some \$75,000 during the event day through the proceeds from food, children's rides, adult activities, sponsorships, and donations, all of which will be used to run our operations in the year ahead.
